Dear Parishioners.

This week the Church celebrates All Saints (holy day of obligation) and All Souls on Wednesday and Thursday. Please check this bulletin for Mass times because they will be different from the normal weekday schedule. These feast days help us look more deeply into the Church's teaching

about Heaven and Purgatory.

What does Jesus say is necessary for a person to enter into Heaven? Jesus makes it very clear when a Jewish religious scholar asked him this very question. The answer given was to love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself. (Luke 10:25-28) It is important to see that Jesus' redundant use of "all" is meant to emphasize that our love of God must not be partial but complete and total. Jesus teaches us that we must love God more than every other person, including our family and friends, and of course to love even our enemies as we love ourselves. (Matt. 10:35-38, Luke 6:35, Matt. 5:44)

Jesus said that if we love God, we will keep God's commandments. (John 14:15) Thankfully, we are also reminded that God's commandments are not burdensome. (1 John 5:3) If we feel that God's commandments are burdensome, it is only because our love of worldly things is greater than our love of God. For example, if I use God's name in vain or don't keep holy the Lord's Day, then my love of God is lacking. My love is also lacking if I'm involved in hatred, rivalry, jealousy, outbursts of fury, acts of selfishness, dissensions, factions, occasions of envy, drinking bouts, etc. God says that those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. (Gal 5:19-21) What happens when a person dies with their love of God and neighbor tainted with impurity and selfishness of various kinds? Jesus tells us that these things are incompatible with heaven. God could leave such people to themselves for eternity or could mercifully allow them to rid themselves of their sinful tendencies. This is the purging that is implied in "Purgatory". We read in Philippians 1:6 that God who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus, which is the Second Coming when God will judge the living and dead. In the Old Testament, we learn that Judas Maccabeus acted in a very excellent and noble way in directing his companions to pray that the sins of the dead be forgiven. Judas and his companions gave themselves to prayer, begging that the sin committed might be completely forgiven. (2 Maccabees 12:43-44) In the New Testament, we learn that St. Paul acted similarly in praying for the dead. Since St. Paul knew those in heaven do not need our prayers and those in hell are beyond our prayers, the Church concluded he was praying for the souls in Purgatory.

In this month of November, let us extend the power of prayer and sacrifice to those who have died. We never abandon those we love in life, and we never abandon them in death either.



From the Desk of Ashley Rastorfer

Governor DeWine, calling for a renewed focus on literacy and the way we teach reading in the state of Ohio, approved a budget ensuring all Ohio children have access to a curriculum aligned with the evidence-based approaches of the Science of Reading – the pedagogy and practices proven by extensive research to effectively teach children how to read including phonemic awareness, vocabulary, reading fluency, and reading comprehension. Research indicates that the earlier a child is reading on grade level, the better that child will do in later grades and in life.

Elementary Reading Instruction

At St. Peter's School, the teachers and I worked diligently to ensure our reading curriculum, instruction, assessments, and teaching practices are aligned with the Science of Reading and the research on how children best learn to

- All reading teachers (K-12) attended a professional development workshop at Mid-Ohio Educational Service Center (MOESC) to learn more about the Science of Reading and the new Dyslexia Support Law.
- A team of elementary reading teachers attended a networking day at MOESC where local educators and administrators in Richland County came together to strategically plan how to implement the Science of Reading in their schools.
- Two elementary teachers applied for and were awarded a Science of Reading microgrant to purchase an evidence-based writing curriculum, Primary Writing Success, aligned with the Science of Reading.
- St. Peter's also purchased evidence-based phonics (Guided Phonics and Beyond) and phonemic awareness programs (Heggerty) that are aligned with the Science of Reading.
- All three curricula (Primary Writing Success, Heggerty, and Guided Phonics and Beyond) have been extensively reviewed by our elementary reading teachers and administrators. The Heggerty curriculum also comes highly recommended by our regional State Support Team and is being used by several surrounding school districts in our area.
- The majority of our elementary school teachers are trained (or will be trained) in Orton-Gillingham and Wilson, which follows the Science of Reading, respecting that the skills needed to become a proficient reader need to be explicitly taught and individualized to the student. Both approaches use multisensory phonics techniques for reading instruction.
- Finally, several elementary teachers will attend a free professional development opportunity on the Science of Reading and dyslexia specifically designed for nonpublic educators and planned by the Ohio Department of Education for November in Columbus.

In addition to the Governor's call for the Ohio Department of Education and Ohio educators to revamp reading instruction, Governor DeWine signed a set of laws strengthening dyslexia support for Ohio children. Ohio recently passed HB 436, requiring Ohio public schools to screen students for dyslexia. As best practice, the Diocese of Toledo encourages all schools in the Diocese to adopt a dyslexia screening assessment tool to identify students who may be "at risk" for dyslexia.

Over the summer, several elementary school reading teachers completed 18 hours of dyslexia modules provided by the Ohio Department of Education, which included information on the Science of Reading, fluency, handwriting, working with students with dyslexia, and more!

The Dynamic Indicators of Basic Literacy Skills (DIBELS), approved by the Ohio Department of Education as a dyslexia screening assessment, was selected to screen all students (K-5). The DIBELS screener is a set of procedures and measures to assess the acquisition of literacy skills and help teachers and schools determine how students are performing on important reading skills. The critical skills necessary for successful beginning reading, often referred to as the "Big Ideas" of reading, include: phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. The DIBELS measures assess students on four of these five critical skills.

All students will be given the DIBELS test three times per year (fall, winter, spring). A student's score on the test gives the school information about whether or not a student is "on track" for grade-level reading success, allowing us to quickly identify students who do not meet the goals on each DIBELS measure and provide extra help. Further, DIBELS provides progress monitoring tools that teachers can use to assess a student's progress with reading interventions. Teachers can also use students' scores to make decisions about how to prepare their day-to-day reading instruction in the classroom. School and district staff can analyze the test scores across classrooms and grade levels to make decisions about how to best use resources to make sure every child in the school is on track to become an accurate and fluent reader.

Preschool Reading Instruction

Last week, I attended a preschool networking meeting that was sponsored by MOESC. Early childhood educators and administrators across Ohio met virtually with the State Support Team for our region on the topic of early literacy and the Science of Reading as it relates to preschool students. Ms. Erin Adkins, the regional early literacy specialist for our region, presented on the importance of early literacy in preparing students for kindergarten and for later in

At our weekly staff meeting, the Montessori teachers and I discussed the importance of early literacy and the three emergent literacy skills as outlined by the Ohio Department of Education Early Learning Content Standards.

These skills include: vocabulary and oral language, phonological and phonemic awareness, and print knowledge. In many ways, the Montessori is already meeting these early literacy standards through daily opportunities to share during morning circle, calendar, social-emotional learning, and show-and-tell; daily line lessons with opportunities for students to "play with language," such as learning about rhyming, syllables, and sequencing; and daily read-alouds to teach students about the concepts of print and that words convey meaning.

The Montessori teachers and I also discussed the Montessori method of reading instruction and how it supports the components of the Science of Reading to get from syllable (letter) to phoneme (putting letters/sounds together to make words) as soon as possible. The process for reading instruction at the Montessori supports this idea. Students begin with learning the capital letters (green book) and then move on to learning lowercase letters and sounds (yellow book). Once students "master" their letters and sounds, they start learning how to identify the beginning and ending sounds of words (blue trays) and how to blend sounds to make words that belong to a word family (pink book). With daily opportunities to receive one-on-one, individualized, reading instruction, students are supported every step of the way to ensure that they have a solid foundation and understanding of each literacy concept before moving on to the next. Further, currently, Heggerty is being implemented in the K-2 classrooms, but beginning in the second quarter, Montessori preschool students will also be receiving daily phonemic awareness instruction using Heggerty.

At St. Peter's, we are very intentional about our curriculum choices and instructional strategies, including the curricula, assessments, instructional strategies, and teaching practices that we selected to support the Science of Reading and the new dyslexia legislation. We will continue to follow the latest updates from Governor DeWine and the Ohio Department of Education as the Governor continues to advocate for childhood literacy and make literacy an educational priority in Ohio schools.








2023 Bereavement Mass, Nov 5


Early Voting - Issue 1 & 2 Threaten Families

Our Catholic faith teaches that parents have a duty to protect and care for their children. These duties are the reason that parents have special rights regarding the education and welfare of children. A constitutional amendment on the ballot in this election would threaten a parent's ability to protect and care for their children. Catholics must Vote NO on Issue 1 and Issue 2 because...

Parental rights are under threat - Issue 1 challenges a parent's right to know about and consent to their child receiving any reproductive interventions, including abortion.

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
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
