From the Pastor:



As I write this, I'm still in Brooklyn, New York, with the religious sisters from the community of the Servants of the Lord. I've been with them a few days now and have been blessed far greater than I imagined. The food is simple and the accommodations even simpler in a monastery that is over 100 years old. However, within the walls

of the building, everything is focused on God, both in the design of the building and the minds and hearts of the young sisters that occupy this space.

The average age of these religious sisters is about 30 years old. Their backgrounds are as diverse as the many places from which they come, such as Louisiana, Arizona, California, Ohio, Canada, Mexico, etc. Many had professional occupations such as nursing and teaching, but now they use their gifts and talents in the cloistered monastery to pray and intercede for the world. They offer themselves each day for the well-being of humanity and the salvation of souls. For those who are tempted to think there are better ways to use their time and talents, they should consider the teachings of the saints. One of the holiest and most spiritually gifted people of recent time is St Padre Pio. He repeatedly said that if it were not for victim souls, like the cloistered religious sisters, the world would have already ended many times.

Their joy was a result of them working each day to follow the teachings and commandments of God. Their diversity in backgrounds and personal preferences can work against community life unless they choose to put God and others first. There is no secret to their success, it's simply living each day to do the will of God as perfectly as possible. Like the Blessed Virgin Mary, they go to bed each night and wake each morning saying, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to Your will Lord.'

This Sunday we hear Jesus say that we too are to align our thoughts, words, and actions according to the teachings and commandments of God. For the times when we have not done this, Jesus says we are to acknowledge those as sins and repent of them. John the Baptist, whom we also hear in the gospel, spent his whole adult life preaching repentance of and conversion from sin. Like the cloistered religious sisters, John the Baptist made a sacrificial offering of himself each day for the benefit of humanity. Like his prayers, his offering of himself brought spiritual assistance to those in need of repentance and conversion.

In the two weeks remaining before Christmas, be sure to visit the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The same spiritual power given to priests to transform ordinary bread and wine into the Real Presence of Christ (Body, Blood, Soul, & Divinity) is the same spiritual power God has given to them to forgive sins in the Sacrament of Confession. We three priests provide ample opportunity for this sacrament every week, but in the week before Christmas we will offer even more opportunities. Please take advantage of this generous offering so that you too can have your sins forgiven by God and receive God's grace to change your life for the better.

As I'm preparing to leave New York for the religious sisters in Kansas, I'm looking forward to the consecration of Kate Cropp, who is a daughter of St Peter Parish. I'm sure my time with that religious community will also be blessed. I'm excited that she will be physically present at 11:30 Mass next weekend (Dec. 17) at St. Peter. Praise be to God that these young ladies heard and answered God's call! Fr. Miller

Last week, St. Peter's community came together to celebrate The Christmas Classic—one of our largest school events that kicks off the holiday season. 36 years ago, Ann Brown, Carol Chambers, and Molly Orsini—three members of Parents Club (now the Spartan Family Association)— "wanted to raise money to do special things for the school and students" that "involved the entire school—students singing, people baking a variety of holiday treats and providing activities for children," according to Brown. The event they envisioned, thanks in large part to the many volunteers they have nurtured over the years, continues to thrive as the Christmas Classic we know today.

While the Classic automatically brings to mind the tasty treats available such as poticas, butter rings, and Jane Wiecher's famous rum cakes, the Christmas Classic is more than a bake sale; it is the entire community coming together, volunteering alongside one another, learning from each other, and becoming part of the enduring legacy of St. Peter's School.

Throughout the month of November, Brown, Orsini, and their well-oiled team of volunteers, rolled out poticas and dipped buckeyes alongside current members of the Spartan Family Association (SFA) and young volunteers such as 3rd grader Oliver Mulherin. High School students would visit the cafeteria to offer a hand and were treated to not only Brown's dough recipe, but also stories of her childhood and the impact our school had on her life.

Born in Wilkowice, Poland, in 1950, Brown explained that "One must understand how poor we were, and how little promise for a good future there was at that time in Communist Poland." Adopted by her aunt Jenny and Uncle Stanley Wala, Brown arrived in the United States at age 10 not knowing any English. As she explains, "I was enrolled in St. Peter's, whose students and staff helped me so much with my language. I have always loved this school community."

As we strive every day to create a community of grace where every student is known, valued, and loved, Brown's story has become central to our identity as a

school, and the Christmas Classic is such a great vehicle to not only share her story with our current students, but also encourage their engagement to help pay forward the many years of service generations of volunteers have provided to enrich our school environment. As they learned about the corporal works of mercy in Nathan Sims' theology class, high school students also enacted them by helping to set up the potica-making stations, clean and set up the cafeteria and auditorium, and decorate the building. Our seniors and elementary students worked together to create gift bags, cards, and our kindergartners made ornaments for our volunteers. Families baked together at community baking events or at home, bringing donated sweets in to be sold at the bake sale.

The day of the event, while Butter Rings were frosted and SFA set up the bake sale, St. Peter's Key Club created a Secret Santa Shop for young shoppers, our cheerleaders prepared and served lunch, and seniors Jerry Thompson and Tamera Lindsay donned their Mr. and Mrs. Claus costumes. As the bake sale hummed along in the cafeteria, preschool and elementary students, who have been preparing with their music teachers since October, entertained their parents and the community with carols, and our elementary, middle, and high school bands added to the festivities, playing holiday songs.

While the final number of dollars raised have not come in yet, no amount of money could surpass our gratitude to Ann Brown and the many generations of our St. Peter's family that came together once again to make this the highlight of our holiday season.



Hello! My name is Kate Cropp! I had the pleasure of growing up in Lexington and being a member of St.

Peter's Parish where I was baptized, received my first communion and confirmation with the guidance from Parish School of Religion. For those who knew me growing up, the fact that I have now consecrated my life to God through the promises of chastity, poverty and obedience can come as quite a shock! I was always



a very independent, outgoing and social girl. I loved sports, fashion, acting, parties and really anything with lots of energy. I never would have imagined that I would become a Catholic sister.

Even as I grew in my Catholic faith at the University of Kansas, where I was going to adoration almost every day, going to daily Mass and spending my free time helping out at retreats, I never REALLY thought that I could be called to religious life. I strongly desired to follow God's will for life – or at least ask Him what He had to say about my future – but I deep down, I believed it would be "impossible" for God to call me, of all people to enter religious life. Good thing that God doesn't work according to our logic nor does He see things as we do.

When I felt the prompting to discern my vocation in an intentional way during my senior year of college, I began to discover that I had viewed religious life all wrong. I saw it as something boring, where you don't have freedom or only renounce good things. How wrong I was! I began to discover deep within my heart desires that I didn't know existed! I began to find freedom and joy that I couldn't find anywhere else. Through daily prayer and spiritual direction, I was able to hear more clearly the voice of God that was calling me "Come and see". To give Him a chance to truly be my Everything. I desired deeply to give myself fully and completely to Jesus, to not hold anything back from Him. Specifically, I wanted to bring others to Christ through prayer and spiritual accompaniment.


So, in January 2018, I entered the community of the Apostles of the Interior Life (AVI), a community that served and provided spiritual direction at the University of Kansas. Our community is a community of women who make promises of chastity, poverty and obedience, founded in Rome, Italy in 1990 by a Roman diocesan priest who desired to have a community that would focus on spiritual formation.

We have four pillars that our life moves around: Prayer, Community Life, Apostolate and Theological Formation. We spend four hours a day in prayer and for our apostolate, we preach retreats, provide spiritual direction and guide people in their spiritual life.

This June I will finish my theology degree from the Lateran, then I will be called to serve in one of our houses either in College Station, TX or Rome, Italy. Thank you for your support and please pray for me (and my community) in this new season for us!




Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament at St Mary
